

Guidance for Employees Working at Home

This document applies to all SFU workers who are working from home or remotely. This document outlines basic guides or protocols for working from home so that everyone understands their role, duties and responsibilities. Supervisors and workers should use these guidelines to ensure they are able to safely work from home and meet work expectations.

Worker Responsibilities:

- All workers who are able to work remotely are encouraged to do so until further notice.
- All workers need to conduct a risk assessment of their workplace and report any hazards to their supervisor. Examples include electrical hazards, trip & fall hazards, ergonomic factors, environmental hazards (e.g., mould, asbestos), potential for violence and chemical hazards.
- Communicate regularly with your supervisor as directed or agreed upon.
- In the event of an emergency, ensure you have a safe location to evacuate to and report to your supervisor.
- Report any signs and symptoms of sickness to your supervisor.
- Report any workplace (at home) injuries to your supervisor.
- Report all working hours, including sick days, vacation days, any other requested time off, etc.
- Follow the SFU's working alone or working in isolation procedures
 - Staff members must advise their supervisor before proceeding to campus.
 - Staff will check with contacts in their destination department ahead of time to know what precautions they should take for the work area they are planning to visit
- Use appropriate data security measures as required by the university to maintain confidentiality as required by the employee's job responsibilities.
- Workers may use their own computers, but if using the university's computer or equipment, the worker must adhere to the university's policy or technology requirements.

Supervisor Responsibilities:

- Determine whether working from home is possible for workers and arrange as necessary.
- Determine whether their employees are working alone or in isolation.
- Establish suitable check-in procedures for employees working alone or in isolation. Procedures must be based on the risk involved in the work assigned.
- Establish expectations (frequency of communication, workload, deadlines, etc.) for the worker.
- Ensure working hours are reported, including any sick day, vacation days, any other requested time off, etc.
- Provide employee guidance on meeting data security and confidentiality related to the work being completed in a remote location.



- Provide the necessary tools for the worker(s) to perform their work remotely, both hardware and software (e.g. laptop, keyboard, Zoom, Skype, etc.).
- Provide equipment/office supplies, according to the university's policy and guideline.
